

The Statement by Ambassador OGASAWARA Ichiro at the Plenary of the Conference on Disarmament on 22 June 2021, as delivered.

First of all, let me congratulate you, Madame President, for your assumption of this very important responsibility. Please be assured of the full cooperation and support of my delegation during your presidency. Also, I am very happy to be guided by your able hands in accordance with the plan, which you have outlined recently.

I would also like to thank the distinguished ambassadors of the United States of America and Russian Federation to present the document of historical importance, the U.S.-Russia Presidential Joint Statement on Strategic Stability, issued on the occasion of the summit meeting held on the 16th of June in Geneva. In the statement, both countries affirm that they will embark together on an integrated bilateral Strategic Stability Dialogue.

When the United States of America and Russian Federation announced the extension of the New START Treaty in February this year, Japan welcomed it and expressed strong hope that this progress would lead to the development of a broader framework of arms control, which involves not only the U.S. and Russia but other countries as well and covers a wider range of weapon systems. I look forward to seeing further developments pursuant to this extension.

We would like to remind you that the United Nations General Assembly resolution, entitled "Joint courses of action and future-oriented dialogue towards a world without nuclear weapons", proposed by Japan and adopted last year by 150 votes in favor, stresses specifically the importance of more transparency among nuclear-weapon States, and reaffirms their special responsibility to initiate arms control dialogues in good faith on effective measures to prevent nuclear arms racing and help to prepare the way for the eventual elimination of nuclear weapons. In this context, I took a good note of an important exchange of remarks between the distinguished Ambassadors of the United States of America and China that took place in the plenary meeting on 11th of June. Japan supports the need for the bilateral dialogue between the U.S and China, which U.S. has called for. In this regard, I would like to recall Japanese Foreign Minister, Mr. Motegi's remarks, at the last year's ARF ministerial meeting. Minister Motegi stated, "we welcome that China, in his effort to fulfill his responsibility as a nuclear-weapon State and as an important player in the international community, is to engage in bilateral dialogue with the United States on arms control as a first step in accordance with the obligation to negotiate in good faith under the NPT. Joining hands with other countries, we encourage such a development."
